Preface

Parallel Programming is now the major field in computer science in both theoretical and practical aspects. Virtually all researchers and practitioners in programming issues related to parallel/concurrent/distributed programming.

TPPP'94 is the first International Workshop on Theory and Practice of Parallel Programming, held at Gonryo-Kaikan, Tohoku University, Sendai, Japan, November 7, 8 and 9, 1994. It focused on theoretical foundations of parallel languages and parallel programming, their implementation issues, and practices of parallel programming. Specific topics included: models of computation, logic, proof, specification of programs, semantics of languages, implementation issues of languages and systems, and architectual support for parallelism and massively parallel computation.
