Additionally, readers should find useful Frank Land's and Elizabeth Somogyi's discussion of software engineering, David Andrews's explanation of his IRG concept, and Ted Hutchin's thoughts on managerial implications.

As to the future, we plan to encourage a correspondence column, have a regular feature on state-of-the-art reports and strengthen our 'noticeboard'. But, above all, this journal is here to serve its readers. So please feel free to communicate with any member of the board, should you wish to publish your ideas, or just help to guide the journal along a path of increasing usefulness.
